Some women living in Dundee face challenges in their life. They may have migrated with family to this country where they know no-one, they don't know the language, and they have no employment prospects. They need support.

For cultural reasons, some women have never been to school, and the Centre provides the opportunity to learn in a safe and supportive environment. Due to a lack of English women can be socially isolated which can lead to poor mental health, low confidence and selfesteem. Attending the Centre reduces isolation and contributes to improved mental health and increased confidence and self-esteem.

Balgeis Abudagaga

My hero is...Balgeis Abudagaga who is from Libya, she came to Dundee 7 years ago with her husband.

Her goal is...(then) To make friends, learn English and contribute to Society (now) To help others and contribute to society (future) To have a business where she can sell Arabic food (as Balgeis is very talented at cooking/ baking)

Event trigger...She came to Dundee 7years ago with her husband as he wanted to study for his PHD in Dundee. He had scholarship (everything was paid for???). They can't go back home due to the unrest in Libya. Isolation and little English language knowledge/skills

Obstacles.... Balgeis knew no-one when she came to Dundee, she had no friends or family here. She had very little English language skills, was not confident and had no help with childcare. Her immigration status at that time meant she or her husband were restricted to the number of hours they could work, although Balgies's language and childcare barriers meant at that time she could not find work.

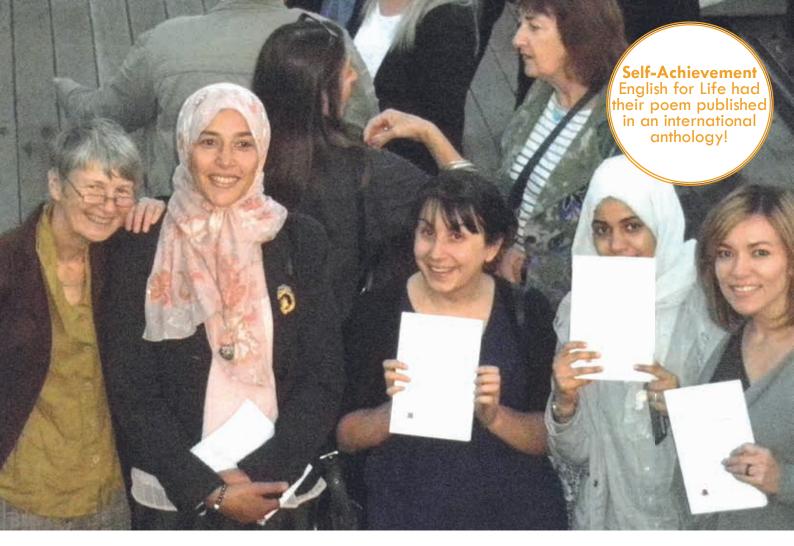
Mentor...Balgeis started to become friendly with some women from the Arab community and they signposted her to DIWC to access our classes and groups. In 2012 Balgies came to DIWC for support. She met with a project worker who listened to her story.

Journey.... Balgeis then enrolled for English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) classes to develop her English language skills and knowledge. Once she completed this course she them moved onto other classes, sewing, cooking, art and English for Life. Balgeis was dedicated to her studies, as her progression was fast in DIWC and in no time she offered to volunteer in many of our classes/events to help others who had been in a similar situation that she had been in. She volunteered in cooking and baking classes to demonstrate traditional recipes from her home country. She also volunteered in sewing class and in the GREAT employability course helping the teacher to deliver the class and helping the learners to fully engage in the sessions, helping them to achieve their own goals of developing employability skills and to find employment. She also volunteered by doing translation, translating English to Arabic and vice versa.

Change...Balgeis is now very much a prominent figure in the Arab community, with many members of this community seeking support from Balgeis for a range of issues such as letters from council, school appointments, utility bills, and GP and hospital appointments. She currently supports new refugees who come to Dundee to access services, settle into Dundee and to feel socially included. Every Saturday, she volunteers in Edinburgh teaching Maths and English to children/young people in their own language. Encouraging them to study these in Arabic so they can then sit the recognised Libyan exams. She also volunteers at Amina Muslim Women's Resource Centre and with DIWC. She is also a sessional worker with DIWC, she takes the lead role in the weekly lunchclub. She prepared and cooks all the lovely and tasty meals. She supports and mentors volunteers who assist in the lunchclub, encouraging them to develop more skills and increasing their softer skills such as confidence and

self-worth. Balgies offers her support when she can for the benefit of others. She has a very positive outlook on life and is very kind, generous and happy.

Lesson...Have a positive outlook on life. Look to help others Share your skills, knowledge and expertise. Be kind, patient, relaxed and happy



English For Life

English for Life is a project-based class for learners with an intermediate level of English. This year we worked on five exciting projects, spoke at one local AGM about women refugees and partnered with three local organisations.

The Voyage Out

Our first project was a series of creative writing sessions run by local poet Lindsay MacGregor. We wrote a beautiful collective poem entitled *last lines* about exile and journeying out into the unknown. Our learners were incredibly proud of their achievements as our poem featured in *the Voyage Out* – an anthology published by the University of Dundee in September 2016.

The Year Book

The Year Book project involved creative writing, art and crafts. It encouraged our learners to reflect on special past personal and group experiences.

A' Adam's Bairns

The class focused on the theme of Scottish identity with the *A' Adam's Bairns* programme facilitated by the One World Centre. They created a frieze depicting the history of immigration in Scotland.

A World Of Difference

A World of Difference' was a One World Centre pilot which challenged our learners to rethink the definition of health as the ability to adapt and self-manage when facing physical, mental and social challenges. The class had the opportunity to meet with the Thursday troupe, a local women's group who had studied the same programme and were keen to get a global perspective on the issue of health. Our learners did a fantastic job at comparing and analysing health related issues between Scotland and their respective countries.

Herstory And Heritage

Our last project was an interative exhibition entitled 'Herstory and heritage' on our learners' personal heritage (recipes, scents, objects, stories and traditions). They shared their reflections with DIWC members when giving them guided tours during International Women's Week.

Macara Youth Group Anzeela Jamil Choudhry

"I started Macara Youth Group when I was 12 years old. I can still remember the day that my mum came home and told me that I had a space. I was so happy and excited! I wanted to start the group as I had no social life outside school and my family.

"I had no social life outside school and my family."

I wanted to meet new people, chill with them and to try new experiences. Over the past year I have developed many **new skills** as part of my role as Youth Leader. I have had the opportunity to increase my **leadership** skills through planning, delivering and evaluating sessions within the youth group which has **increased my confidence** tremendously. I have built new relationships, made new friends and been part of many exciting activities.

This year I feel I have become more relaxed, I have a stronger **sense of self-belief**, I feel I contribute more within the group and share my positivity with others as I support them where I can within and outwith Macara. The youth group is very homely to me, it feels like an extension to my **family**, I can relax, be crazy and **be myself** more in the youth group than anywhere else. I can be me without fear of being judged or criticized.

I have a very positive attitude to life and this has helped me more recently to deal with a disappointing situation. The main goal in my life has always been to attend University to study dentistry. I have had this goal since I was at Primary School, all my studying has been with this goal in mind.

Recently I have had to change my goal due to unfortunate circumstances, I didn't have the grades necessary for the course. This was difficult for me to accept as I had always had this goal in life. However my **positive outlook** on life has helped me to overcome this and I now have a **new goal**. I have an conditional offer for University to do Biomedical Sciences, my thought for my future are to complete this course and then to do a post-grad course in Dentistry. The people who **supported me** through this difficult time, were my Mum, Macara and my friends. I feel strongly that there is no limit to what you can achieve.

Employability

At DIWC we offer a range of services to women looking to improve their career prospects. Some who may never have worked before, or are facing barriers to gaining employment in the UK (for example language and/or qualifications differences), we support each learner to achieve their goals.

For many years we have known that a high number of the women we work with who have gained qualifications and experience in other countries cannot find work in Scotland. This is because either they or prospective employers perceive that their level of English is not adequate and/or that their qualification is not relevant.

Job Search

We offer weekly drop in sessions to support our learners with CV writing, Job search, Interview practice, and employers discuss job opportunities. This year we have supported 61 women through Job Search, 24 have gone onto employment and 3 onto further education.

Yulia Skulskikh

Yulia Skulskikh is a qualified account from Russia, but found it a real challenge to find any kind of job in the UK. Read on for her inspiring story.

Yulia initially came to the Centre to study the SQA Volunteer Skills Award qualification. Keen to find a job, in November 2016 Yulia started regularly attending Job Club, in addition to an independent job search from home. A qualified accountant with experience in retail, Yulia had never worked in the UK. She was willing to try any job.

Yulia decided to volunteer in a charity shop to gain experience and improve her employment prospects.

When her husband suddenly lost his job. however, her need to find work became more urgent. Yulia withdrew from the VSA award, as finding work took priority. After numerous unsuccessful applications she was offered a job in a hotel 20 miles from her home, which she accepted. However, the shifts her employer gave her made it unrealistic to continue as she was spending most of her earnings on travel.

She returned to Job Club determined to find something else, where she completed applications and attended interviews with little success.

Finally, in May 2017 Yulia was offered a retail

(Gaining Recognised Employment and Training). Three groups of women took six week intensive ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) courses aimed towards working in different

employment sectors including Early Years, Customer Service and Science. Following the course, the women took part in six week voluntary placements with employers to give them relevant experience. In addition 3 women completed their Employability Award and SOA

Feedback from the women and the employers providing placements has been excellent, with all the women telling us that the group setting

helped their confidence in spoken and written English and many saying they wanted more lessons!

Yulia's faced many barriers in her search for employment, but her determination saw her through, and she is now enjoying the independence that working gives her.

DIWC growth in 2016-2017

DIWC has increased its annual income from last year (£426,379 compared to £513,191) this year. The expenditure has increased (£496,047 compared to £412,557) to last year. This has resulted in a surplus of £17,144.

Our plan for 16/17 was to continue to consolidate and grow our income from a wider range of income streams, and we have achieved this aim. We have also been successful in renewing funding for our Scottish Government grants in addition to other funds and are confident in our financial stability for 2017/2018 and beyond.
